Supervisors

Defibrillators

Automatic defibrillators have been installed in various parts of the garden (see map overleaf).

Toilet facilities

Chalets are available for your use. Two are accessible to people with reduced mobility (see map overleaf).

Guide dogs for the visually impaired A relaxation area for guide dogs was set up in 2013. Dogs are allowed to roam freely, off-leash, in the area between the "Gay-Lussac" and "Observatoire" gates (see map on front page).

A little bit of history...

After the assassination of her husband Henri IV. Oueen Marie de Médicis wanted to move out of the Palais du Louvre and dreamt of building a Florentine-style palace and park inspired by the Boboli gardens, which reminded her of her native Tuscany.

In 1612, she acquired the Hôtel de François de Luxembourg, which gave its name to the garden. At that time, the garden covered just eight hectares, but Marie de Médicis made numerous acquisitions to enlarge it. Baron Haussmann's work during the Second Empire gave the garden its current appearance. It now covers 23 hectares.

Did you know? The Luxembourg Garden is

managed and maintained by the Senate. As a parliamentary assembly, the Senate proposes, discusses and votes on legislation. It is also responsible for overseeing the Government.

What to do in the Luxembourg Garden?

Every year, the Luxembourg Garden welcomes almost 6.2 million visitors who can enjoy a wide range of activities:



- The LudoJardin, an educational play area for children up to the age of 12;
- Puppet theatre;
- The wooden horse carousel, the swings;
- Pony rides;
- Sailing boats (at the Grand Bassin);
- 6 tennis courts, 4 petangue courts, 1 basketball court
- Chess tables;

The Garden also boasts an exceptional botanical heritage, with 3,000 trees, a fruit garden and 3,600 m2 of glasshouses. Concerts under the music bandstand:

- Horticultural courses:
- A school apiary (with 15 hives);
- Exhibitions (on the outside railings, in the Orangery and in the Davioud Pavilion):
- Two restaurants (on-site and takeaway);
- Numerous stands offering drinks, food, sweets and toys.
